John Anderson has recently been seen with an interesting twin motor seaplane. Here is the scoop on what is a really neat plane.

John calls it his pseudo scale "Notagima BS-1 Fishing Sinker". This plane was a gift from Rami Awwad and started life as a Flying Styro Bumble Bee park flyer kit. It had sort of a swollen cartoon-like stubby orange body, white wings/tail, and optional floats - ugly but cute! To give it a real plane, look, He finished it as a well-weathered early WWII Japanese island-hopping seaplane. It has a span of 47 inches, a length of 25 inches and weighs approximately 1.4 pounds. It is pulled by twin geared-Speed 280s powered by a 7 or 8 cell Ni-MH packs. It flies well enough - but a bit touchy due to the short body moment. As far as water takeoffs, we don't think so. Thanks for the fun Rami!

#### **HSS Meeting Minutes For 5 March 2009**

#### I. Executive Session

- Meeting was called to order at 6:20 p.m. by President Henry Smith. In attendance were officers Henry Smith, Dennis Anderson, Karl Hawley, Fred Hesse, Ross Thomas, Jim Hanson, and Ted Broberg; and Todd MacAndrew and Walter Stewart attended as well. John Anderson called to say he did not want to share his nasty cold with the rest of us, so he did not attend this evening.
- The Grant Application for runway improvements has been filed. It's in the hands of the AMA vice president.
- We've filled out and submitted our application for the Leadership Club. In keeping with the terms of this, we have posted the Club rules, with the notice that whenever there is a difference between a club's rules and the AMA regulations, the local rules take precedence.
- Henry and John met with the contractor who is working on the park grading and paving. Henry favors first doing the runway re-alignment, then seeing what we can do about improving the surface. Fred asked what was planned in the way of fences, and Henry said that the plans seem to change often. The sure thing is that the pools will be fenced. Ross commented that the vernal ponds' borders keep enlarging.
- Henry suggested that we use a football-field chalk-liner, and lay out the 50 by 250 foot area, so fliers can see how large an area it is. Karl suggested using flour rather than chalk in the hopper of the field liner.
- Karl reported that he has mowed the field two days this month, and will mow again tomorrow. He
  mentioned that someone used our mower tractor, and mowed an area near the parking lot -- where we
  are NOT to fly. He plans to replace the container's lock, and sell new keys to authorized members, in
  order to build up a gasoline fund. He'll number the keys, and keep track of who has them. (There seems
  to be a large number of unknown people who have keys to the container.)
- The topic of people operating planes at the field without having the Park Department permits -- and especially those who do not have liability insurance -- has raised many concerns.
- Dennis said that he has the AMA Club Charter for this year. He also received embroidered patches for the staff officers, which he handed out.
- Henry reminded us that he has a container on the way to him, and if we do not make arrangements soon, he'll have to send it back.
- In May, there will be a 2-day Civil War Re-enactment at Fairview Park. We'll try to have a model plane with aerial picture capability. Jim Ward and Jim Hanson will try to get this set up.

Executive session was adjourned at 7:20.

#### II General Session:

- In addition to the above in attendance, we added Roger Nahas, Richard Morley, Walt Cloer, Rob Askegaard, Berkeley Green, Jim Ward, Phil Bland, and Don Hoefeldt.
- Show and Tell: Jim Hanson showed his new helicopter, with retractable landing gear. He uses the 500-size mechanism of T-REX 'copter, and rigged it up in this body, which resembles a Bell 222. It's basically an "Air Wolf," done in a civilian version. Berkeley brought a Depron V-tailed glider. Denny Harrington, Don Hoefeldt, and Kraig Coomber, Denny's son-in-law, brought a FULL-SIZED HANG-GLIDER, and set it up in the lobby. Denny also showed a photo album of places where they've flown the 'glider. Unlike earlier hang gliders, this one has fabric surfaces both above and below the wing frame for a more efficient lifting wing surface, giving glide ratios around 16:I, rather than about 9:1 for a Ragallo-type wing.
- Berkeley mentioned Opening Day 2009 at Newport Sea Base, Saturday, April 18; 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.
  He invites anyone in the club to have a table to introduce our club to visiting young people, or just come
  and get acquainted with the program there.
- Roger Nahas brought us some news about his original auxiliary wing-flap system: He's received a patent
  on the design, and it's been accepted for inclusion in a FULL SIZED aerobatic racer by Mustang
  Aerodynamics! That's a kit-plane company, but not a model airplane company. The purpose of Roger's
  design is to provide slower, shorter, and safer take-off and landing speeds to these high-speed aircraft.
- --Oh, and Roger also won the raffle prize of a old-timer electric model plane! Henry reported that there were 18 people here for the meeting and prize drawing tonight! Best attendance in a long time.

Meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m. Respectfully submitted, Ted Broberg, Secretary.

#### **Last Month's Message from the President**

The following message from the president was distributed on March 2, 2009, by E-mail. It was sent separately from last month's newsletter due to scheduling constraints. We are repeating this message since it did not reach members who receive their newsletter by US Postal Service.

We are continuing to work with the city to improve the runway situation at Fairview Park. On Wednesday John Anderson and I met with the contractor who will be doing improvement work in the park over the coming summer. We should have a firm quote for additional runway grading by mid March. After this, a firm budget covering all planned improvements will be drawn up. We are in the process of applying for an AMA grant to help with funding these improvements.

This months speaker will be our member Denny Mallet. Denny will bring a full size hang glider and talk about his past days of daring-do flying hang gliders over 10,000 ft altitude!!! John Anderson also plans to bring an early type hang glider.

The city has now made it possible to get Fairview Park flying permits on Saturday, 10:00 am - 1:00 pm. at the Downtown Recreation Center, 1860 Anaheim Avenue, Costa Mesa, 714-327-7560. After March 2, 2009 this same site will issue permits Monday - Friday 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Henry Smith, HSS President.

- 4. The Newport Sea Base model class students completed their semester project: semi-scale, e-powered, free-flight fighter designs based upon material from the LUFT46 web site -including a Lippisch flying wing and a Folke Wolf twin-boom pusher (Photos next month). A new class will be starting soon after I complete a bit more medical patching-up. In addition, there is a new prospect of offering a course at Waldorf School.
- 5. I am still sorting through the HSS library -a box of various videos on tape/cd/dvd and may add some of my own collection of videos, books and magazines; and I hope to develop an effective library loan scheme. Ideas? Donations? In any case I plan to begin a startup library loan program at our next meeting.
- 6. Berkeley Green tells us that Charles Goggin (web software designer and fellow RC flyer) is still working on the new web site. Meanwhile Devin Dow, Fred Hesse, and others will be working to improve the content.

#### PLANE RAP NEWSLETTER

I would like to thank Karl Hawley, Walt Cloer and other members who have been mowing the field.

The club board has been quite busy recently what with submitting the AMA Grant Application and also applying for and receiving AMA Silver Leader Club status. Kudos to John Anderson, Fred Hesse, Robert Staples and all the others who worked on these projects.

Moving on to the topic of field improvements, most regular flyers will have noticed part of the field has been cleared of weed and grass using a scraper. The cleared area is approximately 50 feet x 200 feet and simulates a paved runway of the same size. This will allow all pilots to learn it is possible to operate from a runway of this size. Planning and proper pilot techniques are the key to this.

Last month some of the club board members met with the contractor who is currently installing improvements in other areas of the park. At the city's suggestion HSS asked this contractor to submit pricing for moving the dirt mounds west of the runway which would allow re-alignment of the runway so electric airplanes can more easily avoid flying over the sailplane launch area. We have recently received word from the city that the bid to move this dirt and grade the area is \$17,637.00. This is quite a bit more than we had anticipated and beyond the scope of current club finances. The board will now need to search for alternate ways to move this project forward. I hope to have additional information at the April meeting. See you there.

he flew with only 150ft, then he advanced to 300 ft. The Radian flew so well with 300 ft of ribbon that he decided to add another 300 ft to the length of the 2"-wide crepe paper ribbon. It worked like a charm. Not only that, Sandy was having fun making twirls and loops, circles and cork-screws in the sky with the ribbon. I was about to give him a ticket for having too much fun!

The Radian, an excellent trainer for beginners, flew the 600 ft with ease. And that is with the standard electric motor that came with the ARF already installed. (Robert Boehm)

#### Advice From Larry Klingberg – Master Modeler

Larry Klingberg is a member of Orange County Radio Control Club (OCRCC), and took two first place prizes for scale models at the most recent AMA Convention. You may have seen his entries: a Kellett auto gyro, and the big Sikorsky flying boat. These are his suggestions for casting parts for models, as described in the OCRCC newsletter.

Larry obtains his materials from Reynolds Advanced Materials, located at 10856 Vanowen Street, North Hollywood. Phone is 800-358-4349. He uses their "Smooth Cast 300 Series products, specifically Smooth Cast 300, 305, and 310. The product and technical overview sheets give the description of mix ratio, durometer, pot life, de-mold time, and shrinkage, plus surface preparation, preparing to mix, measuring, mixing, applying, curing and performance.

Reynolds Advanced Materials offers seminars on the "Basics of Mold Making and Casting" presented in an easy to understand, demonstrated format. Seminar cost is \$75 and you receive a free life casting starter kit courtesy of the company. Seminar space is limited, the last class was March 19<sup>th</sup> and the company said they offer these classes every other month, so plan ahead and make your reservation if you are interested in pursuing molding.

### **Paint Compatability**

Finishing materials, and especially some of the solvents they contain, react with one another. A lacquer applied over an old coat of the same material will partially dissolve the dry paint, so lacquers rarely peel. Sometimes, when one kind of paint is put over another, the whole finish may dissolve and wrinkle up. We call this a compatibility problem.

The table on the right shows what material can be applied over others. We think you'll find it easy to use. For example, a builder might wish to use Aero Gloss dope over a butyrate dope. Find Aero Gloss dope in the top row which is labeled Over. Find the butyrate dope in the left column labeled Under. The "N" in the table shows the combination not to be compatible.

Maybe a model was originally sealed with dope over the alkyd as the table shows. Perhaps a builder wished to paint a model with one kind of paint and trim it with another. The compatibility table shows if the trim will react with the base color; however, I don't recommend this practice.

Here's another example on how to use

the chart. Vinyl spackle is compatible over polyester resin. Find vinyl spackle in the Over section and read down to polyester resin. Now let's reverse the two materials. Vinyl spackle is not compatible when put Under polyester resin.

Incidentally, always sand any color paint with 320 or 400 grit between coats. Sometimes paints need the rough texture to bite into; not all finishes partially dissolve earlier coats like lacquers do.

No doubt, some very skilled wood finishers may have been able to use materials in a way we say is incompatible. The table favors a conservative, safe approach. Compatibility characteristics change considerably with brands, weather, method of application, and the reducers used. A finisher using materials other than those listed had better plan to test for compatibility on a scrap of wood prepared in the same fashion as the model.

#### OCMA Electric Flying Site at Great Park (El Toro)

Harbor Soaring Society is a member club of Orange County Modelers Association (OCMA) and as such, HSS members can join and fly at the two OCMA flying sites. The new Great Park Flying Site has just been opened up. A map will be provided soon. As reference information, here are the requirements to fly at the Great Park location which is situated on the old El Toro Marine base. The requirements to fly at OCMA's other site at Black Starr Canyon (by Irvine Lake) will be published soon. These requirements reference Orange County Radio Control Club (OCRCC) but are applicable to HSS members as well.

#### **GREAT PARK FLYING SITE REQUIREMENTS**

- Payment of \$500.00 fee for annual use of flying site.
- A waiver indemnifying City of Irvine, Great Park Corporation, ACMI, and OCRCC should any injuries occur on-site. All people on site must have signed annual waiver.
- AMA insurance coverage in the amount of \$2,500,000.00.
- A special membership badge that identifies OCRCC members to Great Park Security personnel allowing access to the flying site.
- Each person at the site must sign a waiver.
   A guest may fly one time and then must join OCRCC to fly again.
- Required blank waivers in a waterproof container that has to be at flying site all hours of operation.
- An OCRCC Field Marshall will be on site during all flying hours. Initial times requested are daylight hours on Sunday, Wednesday and Saturday.

- Field Marshall can be flying if two or more others are flying. There is a maximum of 5 planes in the air at any time. Field Marshalls enforce all rules at all times, no exceptions.
- OCRCC is responsible for policing area after each use ensuring there is no trash left on field or blowing around property.
- Each OCRCC member must have a fire extinguisher at the site while flying.
- No pets allowed.
- No Smoking at site.
- Pilots shall supply an appropriate fireproof container capable of charging whatever size battery is going to be charged.
- Frequency box will be on site to cut possible interference from flyer on Laguna Canyon Road.
- Excluded from site are certain weights and speed of planes such as electric ducted fans and electrics planes over 6 pounds @ 60 miles per hour.

#### **OCMA's New Runway at Black Starr Canyon**

Orange County Modelers Association (OCMA) has completed their new Polypavement runway at Black Starr Canyon. This is a 600' by 60' runway with pits, taxiways, and several large paved areas for helicopters and 3D aircraft. This was professionally installed at a cost of about \$50,000.



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
