Cal State University at Fullerton

Ted Broberg has forwarded this message from Nelson Kays, of the CSUF model plane design team. Nelson is the pilot for the team that made test flights at our field back in June of 2015.

Titan UAV is a student design team at California State University Fullerton. We had the opportunity to compete in two student competitions this year, including SAE Aero Design West in Van Nuys California and SUAS (Students Unmanned Aerial Systems) competing in Maryland. We had two entries in SAE including both regular and advanced class.

Regular class was tasked with designing a plane with a total sum of dimension within 175 inches, and powered by an electric motor drawing no more than 1000 watts. The flight score was based on how much weight it could carry while still being able to take off and land safely. Regular class resulted in a 6th place over all out of 38 international teams with 3rd place in oral presentation.

Advanced class was required to build a plane between 7 and 12 lbs empty weight and powered by an internal combustion engine of no larger than .46 cubic inches displacement. The advanced class flight score was based on static payload up to 15 lb and an additional 3lb droppable sand bag that would be dropped on a target from 100 ft above ground level aimed by a secondary pilot looking through an fpv camera. Advanced class resulted in an 11place ranking over all out of 16 international teams

SUAS was an extracurricular competition which some of the team from regular and some from advanced sub teams worked with computer science and computer engineering classmates to turn one of our planes into an autonomous aerial system that would take off fly a search pattern over an area simulating a search and rescue task would identify and locate the gps coordinates of targets hidden in the field and land autonomously. There were a number of additional tasks including actionable intelligence (reviewing search data while plane is still in flight), adlc(autonomous detection,location and classification), interoperability, sense detect and avoidance of virtual obstacles as well as other tasks.

We resulted 11th place overall out of 39 international teams with a 5th place flight score.

This coming year our leader for next year's team Shadi is leading a team of 7 to enter in SAE Aero Design West advanced class, to compete in Houston Texas next April.

Seen about the Field

Our ace photographer, Rob Askegaard, was suspicious of the Fokker D-VI shown here. For everyone's edification, here are comments about the D-VI courtesy of Wikipedia.

The **Fokker D.VI** was a German fighter aircraft built in limited numbers (59) at the end of <u>World</u> <u>War I</u>. The D.VI served in the German and Austro-Hungarian air services.

In late 1917, <u>Fokker-Flugzeugwerke</u> built two small biplane prototypes designated **V.13**. These aircraft combined a set of scaled-down <u>D.VII</u> wings with a <u>fuselage</u> and <u>empennage</u> closely mirroring those of the earlier <u>Dr.I.^[1]</u> The first prototype utilized an 82 kW (110 hp) <u>Oberursel</u> Ur.II rotary engine, while the second featured a 119 kW (160 hp) <u>Siemens-</u> Halske Sh.III bi-rotary engine

Adhesive Comments

Jim Sonnenmeier has provided an interesting article on adhesives used in model aircraft.

I think it is safe to say that most of the adhesives we use are more than adequate for our jobs. But there are caveats -- no matter the choice of adhesives:

1. The surfaces to be joined must be properly prepared. Surfaces that may have traces of release compounds can be a problem. And some surfaces have textures that create **bonding** difficulties.

2. Different adhesives have differing wetting properties. Some adhesives even have different wetting properties depending on the temperature or state of cure.

3. It is important to employ practices that can minimize voids. Frequently, the creation of voids is a function of the adhesive used independent of the size of the joined area. As a result, voids that would not materially affect large joints can be catastrophic on our smaller joints. We commonly employ carbon caps without wrapping the spars ala Drela. And when stresses are lower this is probably acceptable. But besides conscientious clamping in the Drela style, the wrap greatly reduces the possibility that unsupported voids will result in spar failure.

4. Ask any woodworker what the real secret is to strong joints and they will respond that patience and careful clamping practices are vital. Simply slathering a little adhesive on the joints that attach CF strips to the rest of a structure is an invitation to problems.

Bad Angel



They were admiring its aerodynamic lines and recalled enough history to know that until the Mustangs came into service, the skies over the Pacific Ocean were dominated by Japanese Zeros. Then something very strange caught their eyes. Proudly displayed on the fuselage of 'Bad Angel' were the markings of the pilot's kills: seven Nazis; one Italian; one Japanese AND ONE AMERICAN. Huh? "Bad Angel" shot down an American airplane?

Was it a terrible mistake?

Visitors at Pima Air and Space Museum were in Hanger #4 to view the beautifully restored B-29, when they happened to take notice of a P-51 Mustang near the big bomber. It's name? "Bad Angel."

Couldn't be. If it had been an unfortunate misjudgment, certainly the pilot would not have displayed the American flag. I knew there had to be a good story here. Fortunately for us, one of the Museum's many fine docents was on hand to tell it.

In 1942, the United States needed pilots for its war planes lots of war planes; lots of pilots. Lt. Louis Curdes was one. When he was 22 years old, he graduated flight training school and was shipped off to the Mediterranean to fight Nazis in the air over Southern Europe.

He arrived at his 82nd Fighter Group, 95th Fighter Squadron in April 1943 and was assigned a P-38 Lightning. Ten days later he shot down three German Messerschmitt Bf-109 fighters.

A few weeks later, he downed two more German Bf109's. In less than a month of combat, Louis was an Ace.

During the next three months, Louis shot down an Italian Mc.202 fighter and two more Messerschmitts before his luck ran out. A German fighter shot down his plane on August 27, 1943 over Salerno, Italy.

Captured by the Italians, he was sent to a POW camp near Rome. No doubt this is where he thought he would spend the remaining years of the war. It wasn't to be. A few days later, the Italians surrendered. Louis and a few other pilots escaped before the Nazis could take control of the camp. One might think that such harrowing experiences would have taken the fight out of Louis, yet he volunteered for another combat tour. This time, Uncle Sam sent him to the Philippines where he flew P-51 Mustangs. Soon after arriving in the Pacific Theater, Louis downed a Mitsubishi reconnaissance plane near Formosa. Now he was one of only three Americans to have kills against all three Axis Powers: Germany, Italy, and Japan.

Up until this point, young Lt. Curdes combat career had been stellar. His story was about to take a twist so bizarre that it seems like the fictional creation of a Hollywood screenwriter.

While attacking the Japanese-held island of Bataan, one of Louis's wingmen was shot down. The pilot ditched in the ocean. Circling overhead, Louis could see that his wingman had survived, so he stayed in the area to guide a rescue plane and protect the downed pilot.

It wasn't long before he noticed another, larger airplane, wheels down, preparing to land at the Japanese-held airfield on Bataan. He moved in to investigate. Much to his surprise the approaching plane was a Douglas C-47 transport with American markings.

He tried to make radio contact, but without success. He maneuvered his Mustang in front of the big transport several times trying to wave it off. The C-47 kept heading to its landing target. Apparently the C-47 crew didn't realize they were about to land on a Japanese held island, and soon would be captives.

Lt. Curdes read the daily newspaper accounts of the war, including the viciousness of the Japanese soldiers toward their captives. He knew that whoever was in that American C-47 would be, upon landing, either dead or wish they were. But what could he do?

Audaciously, he lined up his P-51 directly behind the transport, carefully sighted one of his .50 caliber machine guns and knocked out one of its engines. Still the C-47 continued on toward the Bataan airfield. Curdes shifted his aim slightly and knocked out the remaining engine, leaving the baffled pilot no choice but to ditch in the ocean. The big plane came down In one piece about 50 yards from his bobbing wingman. At this point, nightfall and low fuel forced Louis to return to base. The next morning, Louis flew cover for a rescuing PBY that picked up the downed Mustang pilot and 12 passengers and crew, including two female nurses, from the C-47. All survived, and later, Lt. Curdes would end up marrying one of these nurses.

For shooting down an unarmed American transport plane, Lt. Louis Curdes was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. Thereafter, on the fuselage of his P-51 "Bad Angel," he proudly displayed the symbols of his kills: seven German, one Italian, one Japanese and one American flag.



2016 City Flying Permits Available Now

A permit to fly radio-controlled model aircraft is required to operate model aircraft at Fairview Park. This permit can be obtained by going to <u>www.costmesaca.gov</u> and downloading the file Model Airplane Fly Permit 2014.pdf You must also show proof of adequate liability insurance in the form of a current Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) membership card or a current homeowners/personal liability policy specifically covering model aircraft operation with a minimum limit of \$500,000. Rules and regulations for flying the model aircraft can be found in the City of Costa Mesa Municipal Code, Title 12, Chapter II, Articles 2 & 3.

Permit Fee: \$25 per year. Learner's Permit for youths 6-14 years old - \$15 per year.

MAIL-IN Mail your renewal packet (see list below), to include full payment, to:

City of Costa Mesa, P. O. Box 1200, Costa Mesa, CA 92628

Renewal Packet must include **ALL** of the following:

- Permit Application (filled out and signed).
- Copy of your drivers license.

- Copy of the AMA Membership Card (showing the required year) or homeowner's/personal liability insurance policy (specifically covering model airplane/aircraft flying with a minimum limit of \$500,000).

- Renewal Fee (\$25); payment by Check (payable to <u>City of Costa Mesa</u>) or charge to Credit Card (filled out and signed).

Note: Current permit holders with email addresses on file with the City will receive renewal packet via email.

If you have questions or need additional information, please call the Recreation Division at (714) 754-5300.

Note that to fly at Fairview Park you need the above permit, liability insurance (preferably AMA), and you need to follow City of Costa Mesa Ordinance No. 07-01, City Regulations for Issuance, Suspension and Revocation of Permits to Fly at Fairview Park, Academy of Model Aeronautics Safety Code, and the Fairview Park Flying rules posted at the flying site.


Photos of Your Planes


